What Homeschooling Did for Dawn

- It allowed me to find the "holes" in her education and fill them.
- It allowed her to learn how to research things and learn on her own.
- ♦ It gave her academic self-confidence that she didn't have.
- It allowed her to study Scripture in a completely different way.

What Homeschooling Did for Me

A "Typical" Day

I would wake her up at 6:30 AM. If she had done really well on her assignments the day before, I would let her sleep in. She had to be at the desk ready to go in 1 hour.

We would start with math, the one subject in which she NEEDED a teacher. I then would go over her previous day's assignments and give her today's assignments.

I would leave for work. She knew that she had to have her assignments done by the time I got back, because I would need to grade them so that we could start the process all over again.

A Few Examples of What We Did

English

- ⇒ **Vocabulary**: Used Barron's ACT review book for a list of vocabulary words.
- ⇒ **Writing**: She wrote for nearly every subject except math and science. On a history report, the grammar and composition would make her English grade. The content would make her history grade
- ⇒ **Reading:** I went to a university's website that listed "great books" students should read before going to university. I put a list of 30 books together. She had to choose 4 per year. She also got to choose one book not on the list.

Math

- ⇒ This was the one subject she COULD NOT do on her own. I ended up teaching her each lesson myself. As a result, we just used my old textbooks.
- ⇒ As for what is available, I think Videotext, Saxon, and MATH-U-SEE are all solid and user-friendly. Teaching Textbooks is not as rigorous but is still good. Singapore is great but takes a lot of your time. Bob Jones is great if you have access to someone who knows the subject.

Science

⇒ Not surprisingly, I had her do my stuff for science. She did not like science, but she was able to do quite well in it.

Health

⇒ This was not a science course. It was a healthy living course. She had to do regular exercise and choose a diet plan that made sense to her. I also used this as an excuse to talk about sex.

History and U.S. Government

- ⇒ US and World History: Jumbled up a timeline and had her put it in order. Then we stepped through the timeline item-by-item. If I knew what it was, I wrote questions she had to answer. If not, she wrote an essay to educate ME.
- ⇒ Government: Updated the language in the U.S. Constitution.

Geography and World Events

⇒ By Friday of each week, she had to have found an article in the newspaper about a country or region of the world that she had not reported on before. She had to write a report on why it was in the news, where it is on the map, what its economic base was, and what system of government it was under.

Foreign Language

- ⇒ For this one, we sent her to a local university.
- \Rightarrow We also sent her to the same local university for Psychology.
- ⇒ In terms of what is available today, I think Rosetta Stone is wonderful.
